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Business Enterprise Centre Project

1.0 Business Enterprise Centres in Western Australia An Overview

The Small Business Development Corporation (SBDC) supports a network of 37 independent Business Enterprise Centres (BEC's). Each centre has a management committee with representatives from business and public sector organisations and local government that support the BEC Manager. The Centres provide guidance on marketing, business planning, finance, market research, trade information, regulations, licensing and a range of other business improvement services.

The SBDC, through the BEC support Unit, coordinates the core funding program for the BEC's as well as providing a broad range of support services aimed at assisting and improving the service levels with in the network.

The 2002 / 2003 year saw a continuing increase in the client contacts made through the BEC's with a total of 115,140 business enquiries. This activity has facilitated the development of 2,183 businesses, the creation of 3,526 full time jobs and 2,002 casual or part time jobs throughout the state.

The economic impact of the activities of the BEC Network cannot be underestimated. Conservative estimates indicate that an additional \$596 million in business turnover has been added to the State's economy as a direct result of the work of BEC's. This figure does not include the impact on the economy of the additional employment created through these business starts.

Support Centres

In addition to operational grants amounting to \$2,428,000 provided by the State Government, the BEC Network also attracted broad based community support with Local Government contributing \$420,357 during the year. The network was also provided with in-kind support form Local Government through subsidised rent, office accommodation, motor vehicles and subsidised vehicle running costs.

3.0 Operational Plan

3.1 Management Structure

The Business Enterprise Centre is directed by a Committee of Management and employs a full time Manager and a full time Administrative Officer who provide facilitation services and office support services respectively. The committee meet at least monthly to develop policy and provide accountability to the community, ensure the smooth operation of the Centre, provide local business knowledge and assist with developing networks within the community. Committee Members also provide a valuable mentoring resource for Business Enterprise Centre clients.

BEC Facilitator

Mr Denis Godley manages the Business Enterprise Centre. His role is providing facilitation resources and guidance for prospective new business proprietors in marketing, business planning, finance, market research, trade information, regulations, licensing and a full range of other business improvement services. He also works closely with officers from the City of Joondalup's Strategic Planning, Sustainable Development and Marketing departments on projects that promote economic development within the region.

3.2 <u>Statistical History of Centre</u>

Statistics are maintained which measure the level of activity in the centre. These statistics provide details of total contacts and the number of new business start- ups with the resulting estimation of new jobs generated.

The Business Enterprise Centre project seeks to facilitate the creation, expansion, retention and development of sustainable business enterprises within the Perth North West Metropolitan Region.

The objectives of the project are:

- 1. To maximise the creation of employment opportunities by facilitating the establishment of new business start ups within the North West Metropolitan Region.
- 2. To encourage and facilitate the development and broadening of the economic base within the North West Metropolitan Region.

3.5 Strategies

- 1. Provide facilitation resources and guidance for prospective new business proprietors in, marketing, business planning, finance, market research, trade information, regulations, licensing and a full range of other business improvement services.
- **2.** Support new business starters with a range of practical resources and facilities including seminars, library facilities, computer facilities, provision of Small Business Smart Business Training Vouchers and referral to appropriate professional service providers.
- **3.** To facilitate and coordinate the conduct of training and development courses, seminars and workshops for small businesses in the region.
- **4.** To facilitate and administer the Small Business Mentoring Scheme in the region.

3.6 Outcomes

Increased economic activity generated through the development of new business and the creation of new jobs as a result of both new businesses and expanding businesses.

3.7 Key Performance Indicators

- 1. Number of new business starts and the increased economic activity thus generated.
- **2.** Number of new jobs created and the increased economic activity thus generated.
- 3. Number of Training Vouchers requested and issued (*subject to continued funding of scheme*).

3.11 <u>Local Government Sponsorship</u>

With the Small Business Development Corporation and Local Government commitment of funds and support, there can be a high quality level of service to businesses. With the increased interaction between the BEC and the City of Joondalup, (for example, the Supa Shop Workshop series) the use of funds and value added service given to businesses will be great. There will be a closer relationship between the Office of Economic Development and the manager of the BEC with respect to the reporting procedures, and strategic positioning of the service.

Joondalup, as a rapidly developing area, has a high throughput of local client support service provision. The region will continue to benefit from continued local government support.

4.0 Reporting Requirements

4.1 <u>Income and Expenditure</u>

An annual report on Income and Expenditure with Audited Accounts detailing the acquittal of council funds will be supplied within thirty days of the end of each financial year for the duration of the project.

4.2 Review of Performance Objectives and Key Performance Indicators

In line with our requirements to provide detailed statistical and outcome reports to the Small Business Development Corporation we propose a quarterly reporting regime to council on the key performance indicators, outlined in this proposal.
