

MetroPlan ~ 1990

- Current strategic plan
 - 1.4m to 2m people by 2021
- 400,000 new dwellings
 - 80% on green fields
 - 20% in existing urban areas

Planning principles –

- increased emphasis on urban containment and renewal
- corridor development pattern
- balanced distribution of employment

- Perth, Mandurah, Murray to 2031 -
 - 760,000 new people
 - 370,000 new homes
 - 350,000 new jobs
- Community values changing
- Increased understanding of sustainability


Basic Principle of Participation

Move From DAD to PEP

- **D**ecide on a course of action
- Announce the decision and then
- **D**efend the decision from ensuing protests

Composite ideas from the forum

- Key results
 - seven city centres
 - nine activity corridors
 - create town centres
 - make most of existing rail stations
 - identify transport corridors
 - higher density housing
 - various proposals for urban growth boundaries
 - protect natural environment
 - focus employment in regional centres



Network city's vision



Vision

By 2030, Perth people will have created a worldclass sustainable city; vibrant, more compact and accessible, with a unique sense of place.



Network city's objectives



- 1. Deliver urban growth management.
- 2. Accommodate urban growth primarily within a *Network city* pattern, incorporating communities.
- 3. Align transport systems and land use to optimise accessibility and amenity.
- 4. Deliver a safe, reliable and energy-efficient transport system that provides travel choice.
- 5. Protect and enhance the natural environment, open spaces and heritage.



Network city's objectives




- 6. Deliver for all a better quality of life, building on our existing strengths.
- 7. Plan with the community.
- 8. Ensure employment is created in centres.
- 9. Deliver a city with 'urban' energy, creativity and cultural vitality.
- 10. Provide a city plan that will be implemented, provide certainty and deliver results.



The essence of Network city

- Foster land use and transport integration
 - activity centres to bring people together
 - networks that connect people and places
 - communities having sense-of-place and belonging
- An environment that sustains the city
 - reducing the ecological footprint
- Managing growth: efficient use of land
 - staging growth, land supply, affordable housing
 - 60% of new dwellings in existing urban areas
- Engendering participatory democracy
 - local dialogues





Spatial plan and strategy

Activity and specialised centres

- Support a range of activities:
 - employment, retail, living, entertainment,
 - higher eduction, specialised medical etc.
 - Anchor activity corridors: boost public transport patronage

Activity corridors

- Connections between activity centres
- Excellent, high frequency public transport
- Have land uses to support public transport
- Not designed for high-speed through traffic

Transport corridors

- Routes for higher speed through traffic
 - in particular truck routes and express bus
- Designed for inter suburban travel



Priority strategies involve -

- Using governance and process in
 - a whole of government approach
 - creating effective state/local government partnerships
 - engaging with community and industry in implementation
 - guiding and monitoring progress so it is accountable and transparent





Priority strategies involve -


- Planning for a liveable city
 - planning for local places
 with the community to
 develop identity, pride,
 social and cultural capital
 - promoting and facilitating increased housing diversity
 - revitalising existing centres and suburbs
 - encouraging the local mixing of uses to reduce travel demand




- Promoting the economy and employment -
 - implementing planning policies for employment centres
 - locating training/education
 resources to improve
 access to employment
 - building new, and revitalising existing, employment centres
 - providing timely,
 efficiently serviced
 employment land
 connected to *Network city*
