Weed management has also been implemented at Lakeside Park (abutting Yellagonga Regional Park) for the control of grasses that can shed seed into the Yellagonga Regional Park. The City of Joondalup in association with the City of Wanneroo and the Department of Parks and Wildlife has been very successful in the ongoing fox control program within Yellagonga Regional Park. Over 30 foxes have been trapped since the start of the initiative.
