Park Name Change Proposal — Blackthorn Park and Parin Park, Greenwood

Purpose of engagement:

To determine the local community's level of support to change the names of the following parks:

- Blackthorn Park, Greenwood to "Parin Pioneer Park"
- Parin Park, Greenwood to "Ten Mile Peg Park"

Background:

In February 2015, the City received a request to install a memorial at Parin Park to showcase the historical location of the Parin landholding. This request included a park bench, drinking fountain, picnic bench and an arbour.

In February 2016, the requestee met with Elected Members and discussed that the memorial would be better suited to Blackthorn Park as it was larger and more aesthetically pleasing. In May 2017, a letter was sent to the Minister for Lands requesting to change the name of Blackthorn Park to "Parin Pioneer Park" and Parin Park to "Homestead Park". Response from the Minister for Lands indicated that support for the renaming of the parks was "conditional on consultation being conducted with the immediate community" and was dependent on whether "favourable community feedback was received to support the rename request". After being advised of this outcome, the requestee put forward an alternative suggestion that Parin Park be renamed "Ten Mile Peg Park" instead (replacing "Homestead Park").

Summary of project/proposal:

The proposed park name changes aim to recognise the Parin family as one of the early European settler families within the City of Joondalup. Should the City receive community support for changing the park names, an application will be made to Landgate.

Note that the beautification of the southern sump and the installation of a nature play space in Blackthorn Park is scheduled within the City's *2017/18 Capital Works Program* and the draft *2018/19 Capital Works Program*, and will be progressed regardless of the proposed name change.

For a response to be valid, the respondent must include their full contact details; the City will not accept anonymous responses.

Note that both Parin Park and Blackthorn Park are near to the City's border with the City of Wanneroo. As such, responses from residents/ratepayers from other local governments will also be accepted.

Multiple/duplicate responses (if relevant):

The City will only accept 1 response per person.

Evaluation and reporting of engagement outcomes:

Outcomes from the engagement will be analysed and reported to the community via a Community Engagement Outcomes Report. The report will be presented at a Council Meeting and will be uploaded to the “Community Engagement” section of the City’s website.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT OUTCOMES REPORT

Park Name Change Proposal —
Blackthorn Park and Parin Park,
Greenwood

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OVERVIEW

The community was invited to provide feedback from 4 June 2018 to 4 July 2018 on a proposal to change the following park names in Greenwood:

- 'Blackthorn Park' to 'Parin Pioneer Park'
- 'Parin Park' to 'Ten Mile Peg Park'

The City collected a total of 185 valid responses throughout the 31-day advertised engagement period. Of the 947 residents and landowners within 500 metres radii of Blackthorn and Parin Parks, 61 submitted feedback. Further, 76 Community Engagement Network members submitted feedback, as well as 54 community members who were not directly engaged. Feedback was also received from the Member for Girrawheen, Ms Margaret Quirk MLA, indicating an overall response rate of 4.4%.

The majority of respondents (89.2%) reside in the City of Joondalup, with over half of these coming from the suburbs of Greenwood and Kingsley. Almost one-third are between the ages of 65 to 74 years, and no respondents were under the age of 25 years.

Respondents were asked to indicate their level of support for the park name changes: 'Blackthorn Park' to 'Parin Pioneer Park' and 'Parin Park' to 'Ten Mile Peg Park'. 61.6% of respondents indicated that they support the name change: 'Blackthorn Park' to 'Parin Pioneer Park'; however, only 56.8% indicated that they support the name change: 'Parin Park' to 'Ten Mile Peg Park'.

119 respondents provided comments on the proposal. Common themes that emerged included: concerns that the park name change proposal would be too costly and/or a waste of money; and belief that the proposal is unnecessary and could be confusing for residents. A number of respondents also gave feedback in favour of recognising recent history (in general), and recognising the Parin family and the "ten mile peg" marker specifically. A large number of respondents also commented that they thought the park names should be more representative of local Aboriginal history.


ENGAGEMENT MATERIALS

Local residents and landowners within 500 metres radii of either Blackthorn Park or Parin Park (or both) were sent information packs through the post containing a cover letter, Frequently Asked Questions document and Comment Form. These stakeholders were invited to submit feedback via the Comment Form provided or via the online Comment Form. A reversible reply-paid envelope was also provided.







RESPONSE RATE

The City collected a total of 185 valid responses throughout the 31-day advertised engagement period. Responses that were considered valid include all those which contained contact details enabling identification, and were submitted within the advertised engagement period. Where multiple Comment Forms were received from the same respondent, these were combined into one response.

Of the 185 respondents, 125 completed the Comment Form online and 59 respondents submitted hard-copy Comment Forms. 1 respondent provided feedback via telephone which was inputted directly into a Comment Form on their behalf.

Of the 947 residents and landowners within 500 metres radii of Blackthorn and Parin Parks, 61 submitted feedback. Further, 76 Community Engagement Network members submitted feedback, as well as 54 community members who were not directly engaged. Feedback was also received from the Member for Girrawheen, Ms Margaret Quirk MLA, indicating an overall response rate of 4.4%.


DEMOGRAPHICS




Respondent age

QUESTION: “Please indicate your level of support for the park name change proposal: ‘Blackthorn Park’ to ‘Parin Pioneer Park’”


Respondents were asked to indicate their level of support for the proposal to change the name of ‘Blackthorn Park’ to ‘Parin Pioneer Park’. The majority of respondents (114) indicated that they support the park name change proposal with 51 respondents indicating that they would prefer to keep the name ‘Blackthorn Park’. Of the 19 respondents who indicated that they would prefer a different name, 13 suggested that an Aboriginal name would be more appropriate, and 3 suggested the name of another local early colonial family “Lockwood” should be used.

Responses were also analysed by respondent address for those living in the suburbs of Greenwood and Kingsley, other City of Joondalup suburbs (excluding Greenwood and Kingsley) and suburbs outside the City of Joondalup. The majority of respondents in each area separately were supportive of the park name change; approximately 60% of respondents living in Greenwood, Kingsley and other City of Joondalup suburbs, and 80% of respondents living in suburbs outside the City of Joondalup.




Respondents were asked to indicate their level of support for the proposal to change the name of ‘Parin Park’ to ‘Ten Mile Peg Park’. Just over half of respondents (105) indicated that they support the park name change proposal, with 29 respondents indicating that they would prefer to keep the name ‘Parin Park’. Of the 26 respondents who indicated that they would prefer a different name, 13 suggested that an Aboriginal name would be more appropriate, and the remainder suggested a range of different names and variations on the name “Ten Mile Peg”.

Responses were also analysed by respondent address for those living in the suburbs of Greenwood and Kingsley, other City of Joondalup suburbs (excluding Greenwood and Kingsley) and suburbs outside the City of Joondalup. The majority of respondents in each area separately were supportive of the park name change; approximately 55% of respondents living in Greenwood, Kingsley and other City of Joondalup suburbs, and 70% of respondents living in suburbs outside the City of Joondalup.



QUESTION: “Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes?”

Respondents were asked if they had any comments about the proposed park name changes. A total of 119 respondents provided comments. Common themes that emerged included: concerns that the park name change proposal would be too costly and/or a waste of money; and belief that the proposal is unnecessary and could be confusing for residents and visitors. A large number of respondents also gave feedback in favour of recognising recent history (in general), and recognising the Parin family and the “ten mile peg” marker specifically. A number of respondents also commented that they thought the park names should be more representative of local Aboriginal history. Parin Park is located on the corner of Canham Way and Wanneroo Road, Greenwood, and Blackthorn Park is located on Blackthorn Road, Greenwood. A map showing the locations can be found overleaf.

Why is the City proposing to change the names of Parin Park and Blackthorn Park?

The City has received a request to afford greater recognition to the Parin family as one of the early European families to settle in the City of Joondalup region during the early colonial period.

The original Parin landholding and house was located at the existing Parin Park location which was also the location of the historical ten mile peg reference point from the Perth General Post Office.

It has been requested that Blackthorn Park would be a better location for a park named after the family, as it is much larger than the existing Parin Park and is better situated to cater for new infrastructure to showcase the history of the Parin family.

The City acknowledges and celebrates its local history and would like to know if the community supports the proposed park name changes.

What is the significance of the name 'Parin Pioneer Park'?

The name 'Parin Pioneer Park' recognises the significant 'pioneering' role the Parin family played in the region throughout the early 1900s.

The Parin family were early settlers to Western Australia, arriving in 1908 from Croatia. The Parin brothers, Peter and Rocko, moved to what is now Greenwood in 1922. The Parin family were one of five early European families to colonise the Greenwood/Kingsley area and they cultivated the land to produce some of the first retail wines in Wanneroo.

What is the significance of the name 'Ten Mile Peg Park'?

The name 'Ten Mile Peg Park' is an historical reference that recognises the postal marker that used to present at that location.

Up until the 1970s, a 'ten mile peg' stood where the existing park is located. The marker denoted the distance from the Perth General Post Office, in this instance — ten miles. Local residents would refer to their properties in terms of their distance from the Post Office.

Who is being engaged on the park name change proposal?

The City is engaging directly with all City of Joondalup residents and landowners of properties within a 500 metres radius of Parin Park and Blackthorn Park. The City will also be directly seeking feedback from members of the City's online Community Engagement Network who live in Greenwood and Kingsley.



The redevelopment project undertaken at the park has included a community and sporting facility, softball infrastructure, two tennis courts and a hit-up wall, cricket nets, playground, barbecue and picnic shelter.

A public artwork has also been installed, courtesy of artist Phil Gamblien.

Little Ben chimes the Westminster Chimes quarterly – the bells have been replaced by metal rubbish bins and buckets – and also marks the hour (between 9.00am – 5.00pm).

Pioneers in focus on renaming of parks

Residents living within a 500-metre radius of Blackthorn and Parin parks in Greenwood will be asked to provide feedback to the City over a proposal to rename the parks to acknowledge local heritage.

Under the proposal, Blackthorn Park would be renamed Parin Pioneer Park, and Parin Park would be changed to Ten Mile Peg Park.

The Parin family settled in what is now Greenwood in 1922.

Their homestead was located on Parin Park - known historically as Ten Mile Peg, a reference point from Perth Post Office.

The Minister for Lands has provided conditional support for the renaming pending positive community

feedback from the City's residents during the 30-day consultation period.

The City has allocated funding for consideration in its 2018-19 Capital works budget to install a range of features to acknowledge pioneers.

Plans for Kingsley peace precinct

Planning is underway to install five plinths forming a peace and reflection precinct at Kingsley Park and abutting bushland (Lot 971).

Joondalup Council recently resolved to provide residents with a place of tranquility and quiet contemplation.

The plinths generically cover a range of nature's tragedies in addition to commemorating the fallen in wars and other conflicts.

Anzac Day – Lest we forget

Thousands of people are expected to attend the Anzac Day Dawn Service at Joondalup War Memorial in Central Park, Joondalup next Wednesday.

A service will also be held at the Ocean Reef War Memorial at Ocean Reef Sports Club, Harbour Quays.

On the 103rd anniversary of the Gallipoli landing, the services will honour the many servicemen and women who fought for their country in WWI and in subsequent theatres of war.

April 25, 2018 also marks the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Villers-Bretonneux in northern France during which Australian brigades played an important role in ridding the town of German soldiers, three years to the day of the Anzac landing. This battle resulted in significant Australian casualties, just seven months before the end of the war.

Both services are a collaboration between the City and Joondalup City RSL.







Surely this money would be better spent improving the playgrounds or adding some fences to existing playgrounds (For example: Iluka playground is 3/4 enclosed with the open part the closest to the water making it unsafe for a mother to visit with more than one young child). Considering the population of the City of Joondalup, what tiny percentage actually care about this park name change? Do another vote asking your community if you are happy with the quality or quantity of public spaces and you might get responses the community care about.</i>
<i>I lived in Greenwood in 1970 and the Parin family was quite well known as early settlers. I think the renaming is appropriate.</i>
<i>I do not support the name Parin because it recognises only one family; we have and had many unsung heroes in our communities and it is not fair to select only one for recognition in nomenclature.</i>
<i>History should always be acknowledged and maintained, particularly in the case of the early settlers.</i>
<i>I appreciate the need to recognise pioneers of the locality, just concerned that Parin Pioneer Park is a bit of a mouthful! No real objection though, and I applaud the City's nod to its heritage.</i>
<i>Good idea more in keeping with historic benchmark (10 mile peg) and pioneer family.</i>
<i>Good to recognise names of Pioneers in the City of Joondalup and the significance of historical points around the City.</i>
<i>They are lovely names and seems a waste of money to be honest when funds could be used elsewhere for the good of the community — perhaps for the coastal areas in jeopardy!</i>
<i>The renaming of these parks is an appropriate way to acknowledge the Parin family as pioneers of the district. Having spoken to Dorothy Parin, who affirmed that she and her family supports the proposed changes, I am in favour of the name changes being made. It would also be appropriate for a "Ten Mile Peg" marker to be reinstalled, together with explanatory signage, at the existing Parin Park location.</i>

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

Seems pretty unnecessary, especially seeing as one of the parks already bears the name of the family in question. Both proposed names also appear to be unnecessarily long. There is also no shortage of acknowledgements of pioneer histories in place names in the City of Joondalup, or the wider Perth area — if name changes are to be made, surely it is more fitting to try to reflect the more diverse history of the area beyond pioneer histories.

Our country's colonial history is important to be discussed and understood but should not be celebrated as an achievement because the colonial project directly involved attempted genocide of Indigenous people. Making changes to further celebrate settlers like the Parins in an obvious way is, not only disrespectful to Indigenous people affected by being driven off the land now covered by City of Joondalup (who had lived there for 10s of thousands of years), but is part of promoting an inaccurate version of history which paints colonial settlement as a peaceful endeavour, with no mention of the Indigenous people killed to achieve it.

How much will these changes cost? Will it cost local residents, ie in the Council rates?

1. Who made the request for the name change? 2. The current park would also be renamed if changes were made to the sump within the park (Parin). 3. Given the landholding & house existed at the current park, the more reason to rethink the name!! 4. There is currently "Parin Street", "Parin Plaza" & "Parin Park", what more recognition does the Parin family want?

It seems a bit strange that there is already a Parin Park, so why the push to change the name of another park? I am happy to recognise local early settlers, but feel that in this case, it has already been done.

While to recognition of the family with the "Parin Pioneer Park" I believe it would be useful to link it to the nearby site of the family farm

Having lived in Osborne Park as a child, I am familiar with the '10 Mile Peg' designation and it would be nice to have a park as a reminder of early Wanneroo.

It's appropriate according to the history of the area.

Not so much about the name changes, your FAQs explained this and I believe it has merit and am supporting the name changes. However, more information would be nice to be provided about the 'plans' for Blackthorn/Parin Pioneer Park please? You have indicated "It has been requested that Blackthorn Park would be a better location for a park named after the family, as it is much larger than the existing Parin Park and is better situated to cater for new infrastructure to showcase the history of the Parin family." Can you advise what new infrastructure you are proposing? Sounds a good idea to be able to have some informative history at the park to coincide with name changes, but wonder what forms of infrastructure will be used? E.g. signage, displays — will it be maintained etc? I hope there are no plans to remove/cut down any more trees from Blackthorn Park. I also hope in the near future the playground at Blackthorn/Parin Pioneer Park may be upgraded/replaced or enhanced? The park is currently quite under-utilised and has potential and location to be a well-used park in the future. Personally, I would like to see a fenced playground area (ideally a new or upgraded playground equipment too!) to assist with safety of young children so close to Hepburn Avenue and also busy Cockman Street/Canhman Way area. Fenced playgrounds can also assist families who have children with special needs and or parent(s) with multiple children. It may also attract more families to come as a group to the park and feel safe that the children are secure within the playground space. A few more tables and chairs would also be of benefit to locals and workers in the area to utilise as a lunch spot/picnic spot/meeting place for people. I also know some residents in our street (across the road from [- -]) would appreciate some exercise style equipment too! That's my wish list :-)

I agree with the idea of changing both names, but the proposal did not outline how the Parin family would be acknowledged in the redevelopment. I believe too much of our scant history since white settlement is lost. eg The lack of progress on the Luisini vineyard and winery project.

The names are fine, so why change them and then have expense replacing signage?

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

Suggest you set aside some budget from the project to... Beautify the Ten Mile Park sump... New explanatory signage — significance of Ten mile name — original Parin name, pictures, links with Parin family to Greenwood/Kingsley area — directions to new Parin Park. I think it also needs something to draw your attention to the park, maybe an oversize, 2? metre high, obelisk representation of the 10 mile peg, visible from Wanneroo Road.

Name changes just lose history. They confuse people. Blackthorn is perfect given its location! I would suggest placing benches, a table, a shelter perhaps with the Parin name on in recognition. Re-branding is expensive and should be outlawed for this reason. Someone will pay in money or time. Please don't keep on changing names.

I think it is absurd to change the park names and not acknowledge Aboriginal heritage. I think it reflects poorly on Joondalup Council.

It is just a waste of community money which I do not support.

Prefer Lockwood Park. Been owned in Lockwood Family — 1935. 1972. Had piggery there for many years.

My first reaction was that it is a needless bit of paper shuffling, but reading about the history of this family and the “ten mile peg” this is actually making sense. I hope we will include some “features” which can be visited by local schools to learn about the history of this area.

Very appropriate!

Adding more culture via historical awareness is what the City of Joondalup needs. Both names serve this purpose.

The Parin family has been honoured with a park named after their ancestor/s. Parin Park has excellent exposure on what was the major road in their day, a road they used.

Just as Subiaco Oval should have remained Subiaco Oval (not whatever it's called now) so too these parks should keep their original names. Name a new park and street after them instead.

As a [- -] to the Parin pioneers who occupied the subject land in 1918, I fully support the proposal in recognition of the 2 brothers, Rocko [- -] and [- -] Peter. As a matter of record, they were the first to establish a vineyard in the whole of the original Wanneroo. In fact, they were the first to also grow vines in sandy soils, whereby traditionally grown in Swan Valley.

What will happen to the [no further detail provided]

We are very much supporters of the history of our City. Keep up the good work. Thank you.

I like the naming of the 10 Mile Peg Park because of it's obvious historic marker status. I am glad to support the idea of a larger area for the history of the Parin family contribution to the area, even if it is not in the same site as their house originally stood.

If the City wishes to change the names of the park with historical value let it consider and collaborate with the Aboriginal community in renaming the park an Aboriginal term or name in reference and respect to their land. Whilst I am not trying to take away the contribution of the Parin family, I believe it would be more beneficial and respectful to have an Aboriginal title in true reconciliation.

Is it that important to change the names? I'm sure there're more pressing issues to worry about.

I am a UK-born Australian citizen. I find it ridiculous that we are asked to pay tribute to a European settler in this way. Ask the Aboriginal elder what would be most appropriate with reference to the heritage of the land.

Why waste money on stupidity?

Great to have recognition of the areas early history.

See my comments in previous question.

[from previous — I would much prefer an Indigenous name reflecting something that has some meaning that relates to the area. “10 mile” really is a very non-name and has not been called this since when??]

As a [- -], and [- -], I fully support the proposal.

A wonderful initiative. Parin Pioneer Park is a very easy name to remember and we need more historical information within the COJ. Ten Mile Peg Park is also an evocative name of days gone by.

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

I think the name change is a waste of taxpayers' money. Leave them as they are; if you want to rename a Park, do it on a new estate.

I am happy for the Parin Family to be recognised.

I think it is a wonderful idea to place names of pioneers on parks and road names.

Leave the names as they are. I don't like this sort of change as no one knows who the Parins are. It will only confuse people and we have many other things to deal with that are more important than family self-gratification!

I am shocked that the consideration of it being named after early settlers would even be considered — how upsetting.

Re: Blackthorn Park. With an explanation on a plaque revealing the reason for the name (change). It is a busy little park always green and beautiful. SO looking forward to the beautification and installing of the nature play space. Thank you.

My husband and I have lived & raised a family on [- - -] for over 20 years (moved in [- - -]) and have never heard of the Parin association in the street or area. As the street is barricaded all the way from start to finish by the park and nature strip (our end is not a Park but just a bush strip). I feel it should remain "Blackthorn Park" — any changes to name should have been done 50 years ago!!

If the parks were to be renamed, they should be renamed to acknowledge the Whadjuk Noongar people.

The parks have been named and are established. There must be alternative opportunities to further honour the Parin contribution in the community if it is deemed necessary. New roads, or park in new development areas. The size of the park is of little consequence, what makes the Blackthorn Park acceptable for change? — One could re-name Penistone. There is one Parin Park — leave it to that. If one wants to be politically correct, rename the lot with Aboriginal names — it happens elsewhere in Australia.

I believe the name changes are of little value to the community and any funds employed in changes to signage & etc. would be better utilised in other more important projects.

Very important to move towards integrating and reflecting early history and contribution of First Peoples, rather than continuing to celebrate colonised history which has, and continues to have, a devastating impact on Aboriginal people. There is a need for our local communities to support broader government policies around reconciliation; name changes are a small but meaningful way to do such.

Yes, at what cost to the ratepayers of Greenwood, Kingsley, do these name changes come at?

Yes. Are you sure the Parin family has a good record of relations with Indigenous people in this area? Have you consulted the traditional owners of the land?

As above. I believe we need to move over to including a move to Indigenous names.

When I was young we used to ride our bikes from Tuart Hill to Mullaloo along Wanneroo Road and I can recall some of the Mile Pegs associated with various landmarks. It is important to preserve history, and the reasoning behind the proposal is sound.

Give credit to whom it belongs.

I think it appropriate for the name change to honour and reflect upon a family of pioneers.

When the works are completed, an unveiling event for the local residents should organised.

Fully agree the name to be Parin Park.

If these changes cost money, we are adamantly against them...there are much more important ways to spend our City's funds...for example, lowering entry and creche fees at Craigie Leisure Centre (and eliminating the ridiculous spectator fee) will help to improve citizens health; putting a crosswalk in nearby parks like Tom Simpson will help to improve citizens' safety; bringing back the verge collection which has been a high priority for many citizens, etc.

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

As a resident battling to meet the ever-rising costs of local governance, I am not in support of unnecessary changes which result in costs to the ratepayers, particularly when they are for the benefit of the ego of one family only. The cost of making such a change has not been provided in the proposal; however, there are clearly significant costs associated in updating maps, GPS data, etc., well beyond the simple cost of changing some signs, and all of these can be avoided by maintaining the status quo.

Keep both parks tidy and maintained.

As per two previous answers. If we start to embrace our traditional owners we will start to reduce the gap.

Long history of the area and 2 [- -] also lived in the area and the family farmed the area in question and should be called "Lockwood Park" after their family. [- -] can be contacted via phone on [- -] — no email address.

What a waste of ratepayers' money and cost and time that we even consider and debate this. There must be more important things to solve, create, and improve than name changes. The cost and time put into this is ridiculous.

It disgusts me that our Indigenous Australians are yet again ignored and the colonialists are recognised. It's time for change Australia!!!!!!

Only that surely there is another historical family for this area that could be honoured instead of a mileage from GPO peg.

I would like to see recognition of both Indigenous and European settlers, rather than recognition of one European family. There must be an Indigenous heritage, but I don't see any recognition of it. I would also like to know the origin of the Blackthorn Park name.

I think it is important to keep at least one park in the Parin name for historical reference. The Ten Mile name sounds great. Reminds one of the pioneers.

Good to see the Parin family name acknowledged, and the Ten-Mile Peg to be marked as part of their, and Wanneroo's, heritage.

This name change will recognise the Parin pioneers on a more useful reserve/park.

No reason to change the name, it's been Blackthorn Park since 1972; people can relate to where the park is situated, Just a waste of ratepayers' money. As for Parin Park to 10 Mile Peg, makes more sense as its 10 miles from City, otherwise just leave it alone.

If Blackthorn Park is to be renamed, I would prefer to see it renamed to acknowledge two pioneering families in the district so Parin–Lockwood Park. The existing Blackthorn Park is sited on the former pig farm of the Lockwood family. Jack and Norm Lockwood had a piggery at the location for many years up until the property was sold in the early 1970s for a residential development. They were farming at the same time as the Parin family who were neighbouring farmers where the current Parin Park is located. A Lockwood descendant, [- -], still lives within the City of Joondalup. In this way, you are acknowledging two farming families within the district, and could create displays showing the history of both families.

Our State was built by hard working immigrants. They shaped the diversity on which it now become. They should be remembered and recognised.

I feel that the renaming of 'Blackthorn Park' to 'Parin Park' is so much more suited as it a much nicer park & reflects the fact that the Parins 'pioneered' & established their property on this area of what is now Greenwood.

The existing Parin Park should not be changed as it recognises the location of the original Parin house and landholding. Changing the name to Parin Pioneer Park is OK. I don't believe the term "Ten Mile Peg" would be widely recognised today; however, the Chicken Inn was definitely a well-known landmark at the sight. Blackthorn Park's name should not be changed. The size of the two parks is irrelevant. I believe the Parin family should also be consulted.

Why waste ratepayers' funds on an unnecessary change of names? The Parins already have a park named after them.

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

I have an interest in Greenwood history (and the region as well). This came about having read the excellent booklet put out by City of Joondalup libraries titled 'The Story of Greenwood' a few years ago. The proposed name changes would be the start of your proposal for a heritage precinct project acknowledging history of the areas.

I fully support the name changes. It's a good beginning for recognition of pioneer families and the first heritage precinct in Joondalup. Those involved are to be congratulated on the research and progress made to date.

If it was my land, I would want the name of the park where my house was, not a piece of land I owned. Ten Mile means nothing nowadays, leave it as it is.

I feel that changing BOTH park names would be suitable & reflect the establishment of the area in earlier days. The Parin family acquired the land, lived & worked their vineyards here, and deserve the pleasant surrounds now known as "Blackthorn Park" to honour their name & "Ten Mile Peg" known in pioneering advancement as the road headed North from Perth (GPO) is suitable now along Wanneroo Road.

[multiple comment forms submitted] I feel BOTH park name changes suitable & reflect the pioneering spirit of the area. The Parin family living & establishing their vineyards in this area & "Ten Mile Peg", the historical recorded point from Perth (GPO) along the road heading north.

I support the changes, but would have appreciated CoJ explaining in more detail as to why Blackthorn Park was given its name in the first place, and also what is the relevance of "Ten Mile Peg".

Let's continue acknowledgment of the 50,000 years of Noongar connection, rather than the new arrivals.

Don't waste any money on something that doesn't help the people paying.

I believe we should keep the name Blackthorn as is.

They reflect the heritage of the area and the name of one of the pioneer settlers. It is important for current residents to remember the hard work and fortitude of these early settlers in initiating the development of their suburbs.

In a previous survey, I noted that trees planted in the middle of Blackall Drive was a great idea. However, I also asked when were the trees that did not survive (for various reasons) be replaced? Could you please advise me via email if possible — thanks.

Any name change that is to be made should be made in honour of the people who belonged to the land long before white colonisation took what wasn't theirs. To even consider putting the name of a settler's family on a park is an insult to the local people and, as a local government, you should be ashamed to make the suggestion. And to be clear I am "not" of Aboriginal decent, my family came to this land as convicts, not of their choice, and it was a long time before the 1900s; I strongly believe you need to step back and reconsider you options on this before proceeding. We all share the land now but we need to respect the people that belonged to the land before us. So I say, give it an Aboriginal name or word. Let them decide what we should call it. And don't waste my taxes and rates by renaming a bigger park in some family's name that has no real significance to the land other than they came here like all of us other colonial settlers and convicts. Yours Sincerely [- - -]

Changing park names seems an unnecessary waste of time and money, and if you have to do it, then change the names to something that celebrates the traditional owners of the land or current "heroes" in civil service. There are more than enough memorials to the settlers.

Nil (keep them as they were).

I do not feel this is a good way to spend ratepayers' money. Use the money to upgrade our roads. I also do not think early settlers should have the glory of a park named after them. Honour the Indigenous families, they were here first.

Verbatim responses — Do you have any comments about the proposed park name changes (N = 119):

I'm sure the Parin family contributed to the area but, to be realistic, it was land that displaced local Indigenous people and destroyed local flora. Yes, vineyards were needed, but the crop was not a main staple and was done as a business not a charity. The family, along with others, did this to make money and, yes, put some back into the area, but that was done to improve their own lives. Please do not rename a park to bestow more honour when it is not required.

Whilst it is always good to recognise people, we have to bear in mind the cost and disturbance that this will have, and this needs weighing up against the advantage of naming the larger park after the Parins. As no mention of these costs and disturbance has been made, then people are just voting on emotion and could change their opinion once these (costs & disturbance factors) are known.

Good ideas to honour the early settlers.

While it's excellent to recognise the historical significance of pioneer families, it's important parks have names related to their geographical location for the convenience of families wanting to utilise them. This doesn't preclude infrastructure or memorials to the pioneer families. Incidentally, I've lived in Duncraig since [- -] and I've never heard of the Parin family! It's good to recognise the 10 mile peg, but that could still happen. I think that's an interesting idea as I don't know about that either!

Keeping the history of the area is important.

The Parin family have played a very big part in the history of Wanneroo and deserve some historical recognition.

Name change would be a mark of respect to the Parin family as they were early pioneers to the area and are well worthy. [- -]

Don't mind the change. Parins were pioneers.

OK with me. Seems pretty logical.

I just think the Ten Mile Peg Park is not a great name. Maybe consider the Indigenous name for Greenwood and call it that name.

I think it is fabulous to change the names of local parks to recognise the pioneers of the area.

Brilliant to honour the locations associated with pioneering families who first tilled the soil there. Thank you so much for your consideration to bringing closure for the Parin family.

No objection to either of the name changes.

Nice to recognise early pioneers of the area for a change.

TEN PEG PARK sounds better than TEN MILE PEG. A stone monument, or one that can't be vandalised, with a plaque giving information on why it's been named would be better than adding the MILE in. Even if the monument is only a stone peg shape would signify the spot with a 10 on it.

No, other than that, I support the move to recognise the early pioneers who first settled the northern suburbs.

I support the recognition of the suburb's history.

Stop wasting our money on silly thing.

Why change, it does not enhance the Parin family importance by removing name from one park and moving to another site — administration cost to change signage etc is not warranted.






