Joondalup: The Most Liveable City in Australia for 2030

It's the year 2030 and Joondalup is a thriving city, in fact, it has just been awarded as the most liveable city in Australia. This recognition has been built through a decade of efforts to foster community wellbeing and sustainably manage the unique natural environment of the region. The liveability judges aptly summarised the attraction of Joondalup in their awards presentation with 'Joondalup is a green and leafy, walkable and cyclable city, with a connected network of green biodiversity hotspots, where community can meet and interact effortlessly'. Of course, getting to this stage has taken a community-wide effort and buy in to a 'live, work and play' ethos for the City.

Early in the decade, and in response to the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic, the Joondalup community made a determined effort to grow the sense of community, social equity and self-sufficiency within the region. Multi-stakeholder programs, focused on eradicating homelessness and providing low income housing, were implemented, infill targets were achieved with good community input and satisfaction, and the streets were lined with leafy trees and verge gardens to complement the undergrounding of the power lines. By mid-decade, bicycles began to outnumber cars within the CBD and new public transport links with the wider Perth region were being increasingly utilised. By 2030, the City of Joondalup spearheaded a sustainable energy initiative which resulted in all Council buildings and major commercial buildings utilising 100% renewable energy. This has set the tone for sustainability innovations in the suburbs too, with suburban battery banks and energy trading now available to residents.

Economically, the City is buzzing. The CBD is a hub of activity and visitors are often heard remarking 'It kind of feels like Melbourne' as they enjoy moving between shops and cafés. Ocean Reef and Hillarys Marinas also draw visitors from across the globe, as they enjoy the world class facilities, proximity to wonderful beaches and trips to Rottnest island. Perhaps most emblematic of the community-centric mindset that emerged from the 2020 pandemic, is that suburban activity centres have flourished as multi-purpose spots for a growing number of residents who work flexibly from home.

This transition to the most liveable city in Australia has been a collaborative effort and the education, cyber security and health sectors have all bought into the 'live, work and play in Joondalup' ethos. This has fostered innovations and growth within these sectors but has also encouraged social enterprises and commercial start-ups to flourish in the City, as some of the State's brightest minds work and play together. The City of Joondalup has played a facilitative role in terms of connecting and incentivising community members and organisations to come together, collaborate and achieve common goals.

Joondalup residents are renowned for never missing a day to enjoy their special City, whether it be strolling the endless dual use walk/cycle paths, meditating on the beauty of the natural bushland, lakes and wildflowers, enjoying world class music events and concerts, or simply taking a dip at the beach. It's this plethora of opportunities to connect with nature, community and self in an environmentally and socially responsible way that makes Joondalup the most liveable city in Australia in 2030.

The participants reflected on their work over four meetings with a final visioning exercise based on the following focus question and prompts:

Imagine it is 2030 and the City of Joondalup is a thriving place, so much so that an article has been written about the amazing transformation of the City:

- **Major accomplishments**: What are your top two major accomplishments or 'big wins' that residents are most proud of? What are the news headlines?
- **Breakthroughs:** What is the most significant breakthrough that launched the City to a whole new level? What is different?
- **Testimonials from residents or visitors:** Pick one or two 'representative' residents or visitors and write a two sentence, first person quote on why are they so impressed with your City. What are people saying?
- Collaborators: Are there new or unusual allies that are contributing to the success of your City?
- **Your niche:** There are other cities similar to your own, but how is Joondalup, specifically, unique and different?
- No-go zones: Are there any services or approaches that the City has moved away from?
- Collaboration: How are people working together across the community and with the City of Joondalup?
- People and Leadership: Who is providing leadership in the City and how is it different?

Shared Vision

The shared vision is:

Joondalup: The Most Liveable City in Australia for 2030

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Early in the decade, and in response to the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic, the Joondalup community made a determined effort to grow the sense of community, social equity and self-sufficiency within the region. Multi-stakeholder programs, focused on eradicating homelessness and providing low income housing, were implemented, infill targets were achieved with good community input and satisfaction, and the streets were lined with leafy trees and verge gardens to complement the undergrounding of the power lines. By mid-decade, bicycles began to outnumber cars within the CBD and new public transport links with the wider Perth region were being increasingly utilised. By 2030, the City of Joondalup spearheaded a sustainable energy initiative which resulted in all Council buildings and major commercial buildings utilising 100% renewable energy. This has set the tone for sustainability innovations in the suburbs too, with suburban battery banks and energy trading now available to residents.

Economically, the City is buzzing. The CBD is a hub of activity and visitors are often heard remarking 'It kind of feels like Melbourne' as they enjoy moving between shops and cafés. Ocean Reef and Hillarys Marinas also draw visitors from across the globe, as they enjoy the world class facilities, proximity to wonderful beaches and trips to Rottnest island. Perhaps most emblematic of the community-centric mindset that emerged from the 2020 pandemic, is that suburban activity centres have flourished as multi-purpose spots for a growing number of residents who work flexibly from home.

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Joondalup residents are renowned for never missing a day to enjoy their special City, whether it be strolling the endless dual use walk/cycle paths, meditating on the beauty of the natural bushland, lakes and wildflowers, enjoying world class music events and concerts, or simply taking a dip at the beach. It's this plethora of opportunities to connect with nature, community and self in an environmentally and socially responsible way that makes Joondalup the most liveable city in Australia in 2030.

Strategic Community Reference Group Terms of Reference

1. Name

The name of the Reference Group shall be the Strategic Community Reference Group.

2. Aims and Objectives

The purpose of the Strategic Community Reference Group is to provide advice to the Council on:

- · Matters of significant community interest;
- Strategic initiatives;

as determined by the Council.

3. Membership

The Strategic Community Reference Group will consist of the following:

3.1 Elected Members

A maximum of four Elected Members with one Elected Member nominated as Presiding Member.

3.2 Community Members

- 3.2.1 A maximum of two community members from each of the six wards of the district (to be selected by the Council from nominations received). Criteria for the selection will be based on the individual's interest, experience and/or qualifications in issues pertaining to the City of Joondalup community, in general.
- 3.2.2 Community Member places will be advertised and interested residents/ratepayers will be requested to submit an Expression of Interest addressing specific criteria outlined in the Expression of Interest Form.
- 3.2.3 Information on the Strategic Community
 Reference Group and the call for Expressions
 of Interest will also be sent to ratepayer groups
 in each ward.
- **3.2.4** Final selection for serving on the Strategic Community Reference Group will be determined by Council.

3.3 Experts

- 3.3.1 Up to four temporary places will be available for suitably qualified professionals who can provide expert advice/information as necessary.
- **3.3.2** The Strategic Community Reference Group has the authority to second the suitably qualified professionals referred to in 3.3.1 above from outside of the Reference Group on a voluntary basis for their expert advice where required.

3.4 Community Ward Representation

If an item referred to the Strategic Community Reference Group is within a specific location, the Council may consider that additional temporary places be made available for ratepayer groups in the relevant Ward.

3.5 Terms of Membership

The term of membership will be for two years commencing on 1 December and concluding in October in line with the ordinary Council election cycle.

3.6 City Officers

The Chief Executive Officer or representative will attend meetings of the Strategic Community Reference Group to represent matters to be presented with other Officers to be invited as required depending on the agenda issue, and City Officers will provide technical advice and support where required and are not members of the Strategic Community Reference Group.

4. Meetings

- **4.1** The Strategic Community Reference Group shall convene no more than two meetings to consider an individual issue.
- **4.2** A quorum for any meeting of the Strategic Community Reference Group shall be no less than two of the four Elected Members and four of the twelve community members.
- 4.3 The Presiding Member will preside at all meetings and is responsible for the proper conduct of the meetings. In his/her absence the role of Presiding Member will be assumed by any of the other three Elected Members nominated to the Strategic Community Reference Group by the Council.

5 Agendas

- 5.1 The City will determine the Agenda for each meeting in accordance with the Work Plan for the Strategic Community Reference Group endorsed by the Council.
- 5.2 All meetings shall be confined to the items listed on the Work Plan unless the Council determines that additional matters be referred to the Strategic Community Reference Group.
- **5.3** The meetings of the Strategic Community Reference Group cannot call for reports outside of the Work Plan or items referred to it by Council.
- **5.4** Work Plans will be developed annually by City officers and endorsed by the Council taking account of the City's strategic planning objectives, annual priorities as per the Annual Plan, or other City Plans or initiatives.

6 Notes of Meetings

City staff will maintain notes of the items discussed at each meeting and the outcomes from the Strategic Community Reference Group discussions. The notes may be used as the basis for further action by the City on an item.

7 Insurances

The City shall arrange all insurances affecting the Strategic Community Reference Group in discharging the normal course of its duties and for any associated public liability.

8 Management

- **8.1** The Strategic Community Reference Group has no delegated powers or authority to:
 - **8.1.1** Represent the City of Joondalup.
 - **8.1.2** Implement Strategic Community Reference Group recommendations without approval of the Council.
 - **8.1.3** Commit Council to the expenditure of funds.
- **8.2** Strategic Community Reference Group Members must comply with the City's Code of Conduct.

9 Tenure of Appointment

If a member fails to attend three consecutive meetings of the Strategic Community Reference Group his/her appointment shall be automatically terminated unless leave of absence has been granted.
